

- **Global Handwashing Day** for first time in 2008



Events

- **533** – Byzantine general Belisarius makes his formal entry into Carthage, having conquered it from the Vandals.
- **1552** – Khanate of Kazan is conquered by troops of Ivan Grozny.
- **1582** – Pope Gregory XIII implements the Gregorian calendar. In Italy, Poland, Portugal, and Spain, October 4 of this year is followed directly by October 15.
- **1761** – Edward Gibbon chooses a group of five scribes in the ruined Temple of Jupiter in Rome, which inspires him to begin work on *The History of the Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire*.

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
