Cabot has written many novels for children, teenagers and adults, under several pen names: Meg Cabot,^[4] Meggin Cabot,^[4] Patricia Cabot,^[4] and Jenny Carroll.^[2] Cabot has also written many types of novels, including historical romances, contemporary chick lit, and young adult series with themes of mystery and paranormal suspense.^[5] Her books have sold over 15 million copies in the world.^[6]
