Grandparents Increase Risk of Obesity in Children

Leaving your children with their grandparents may be bad for the little ones' health. This is according to new research in the 'International Journal of Obesity'. The British study showed that children who are looked after by their grandparents tend to be more overweight. Researchers looked at over 12,000 toddlers between the ages of nine months and three years. Their data showed that grandparents increased the risk of obesity in the children by as much as 34 per cent.
